- **OhioLINK- Electronic Journal Center (EJC):** Full text of 7000+ research journals.
- **EBSCO- Academic Search Complete:** Academic Search Complete is the world's most comprehensive scholarly, multi-disciplinary full-text database, with more than 5,300 full-text periodicals, including 4,400 peer-reviewed journals. In addition to full text, this database offers indexing and abstracts for more than 9,300 journals and a total of 10,900 publications including monographs, reports, conference proceedings, etc.
- **EBSCO- CINAHL:** CINAHL Plus with Full Text is the world's most comprehensive source of full text for nursing & allied health journals, providing full text for more than 750 journals indexed in CINAHL. *CINAHL Plus with Full Text* is the definitive research tool for all areas of nursing and allied health literature.
